## **Message from the Minister....**

On becoming Minister of Māori Development, I wanted to support Māori Wardens to make decisions about the future. I acknowledge the efforts of my predecessors and know that we are an important juncture in the journey.

Along the way, I have listened and tried to reflect back the issues you have identified as critical to moving forward. This year at Tūrangawaewae I want to thank each district who were prepared to make decisions on your future and to vote collectively. The pōwhiri, on a brisk winter afternoon, resonated with beautiful karanga, whaikōrero and waiata. Following the pōwhiri, Māori Wardens enjoyed catching up with each other over afternoon tea.

A brief whakatau was held for the remaining South Island Māori Wardens, who arrived at 5.30pm.

Whilst over 450 Māori Wardens registered to attend the Conference, just under 400 attended, from across all Districts.

Additional attendees included:

- the Minister for Māori Development;
- officials from Te Puni Kōkiri (Māori Wardens Project Team and Policy Puni supports);
- NZ Police Deputy Commissioner Wallace Haumaha and officials; and
- the Deputy Chair and Executive Director of the New Zealand Māori Council.

The Deputy Prime Minister tabled his apologies via his video message shared with all attendees at the Friday morning session.



Following the pōwhiri and kai o te ahiahi, Māori Wardens were able to complete their registrations, collect their Conference packs, and settle in to their accommodation.

All Māori Wardens received a programme (and other supporting material) on a lanyard, and a bag containing:

- a First Aid kit;
- a Māori Wardens notebook;
- a Māori Wardens hot/cold flask; and
- a Māori Wardens beanie.

As you can see, the team had a great time packing them for everyone.



## Awards

At the Conference Dinner, a (surprise) Awards ceremony was held at which:

- 33 Māori Wardens (as nominated by Districts) received Long-Service (40+ years) Awards from the Minister for Māori Development; and
- 5 Māori Wardens and the Māori Wardens Project Manager received Special Recognition Awards from NZ Police, presented by Wallace Haumaha, Deputy Commissioner of Māori, Pasifika and Ethnic Services.



The opening address by the Minister covered:

- an affirmation of the legacy of Māori Wardens;
- acknowledgement of the contributions of Māori Wardens in the Rangatahi Courts by Judge Denise Clark;
- a summary of the journey thus far, including gathering feedback from Māori Wardens, and developing modernisation options;
- the call for unity, and for all Wardens to stand together with mutual respect and a shared direction; and
- a message from the Deputy Prime Minister, including announcement of new funding secured in Budget 2019 to support modernisation of the Māori Wardens.

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Deputy Commissioner Haumaha then spoke, affirming the continuing commitment of NZ Police to supporting Māori Wardens, and working with Te Puni Kōkiri through the Māori Wardens Project.

His kōrero also included his personal insights into the significant contributions that Māori Wardens make on our marae and in our communities.

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Henare Mason, Deputy Chair of the New Zealand Māori Council spoke about how the Council was revitalising itself, and sought to have a constructive relationship with the Minister.

He also spoke of the Council's support for the modernisation of Māori Wardens – according to the needs and interests of Māori Wardens.

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Phil Nesbit spoke about how the NZ Fire Service operates, as a potential model for Wardens to look at in the future (for full autonomy). His focus on the "dos and don'ts" (in setting up and operating your own organisation) provided valuable insights based on the experiences of their members.

## District Votes on Modernisation Options

Immediately following morning tea, the tabling of District votes on the modernisation options was held.

Results are shown below.

In reporting their modernisation option votes, Districts also made points that had emerged from their discussions. In relation to Role and Powers, key points included:

- the desire to retain warrants (as a form of Crown-mandated authority for Wardens' activities), and appointment by the Minister for Māori Development;
- an interest in others in communities being able to nominate Wardens, as a way of securing wider support for Wardens; and
- the need for the work that Māori Wardens do in different settings (e.g. Courts) to be formally recognised.

Key points made by Districts included:

- whilst Districts had voted for increased autonomy, this was with a view to achieving full autonomy within 3-5 years;
- the need for national unity (*kōtahitanga*) and recognition of District rangatiratanga;
- a desire to explore having 9 Regions instead of 16 Districts, across which funding can be equally allocated (without creating competition); and
- recognition that, whilst the Māori Wardens Association had served a purpose in supporting Wardens in the past, it needed to be ‘put to bed’ (including ‘subs’ and regalia), and a new national entity established to support Māori Wardens into the future.

There were also a number of general (but related) points made, including:

- the need to establish a Rangatahi Committee, to focus on succession and strengthen the participation of rangatahi;
- the desire that Māori Wardens continue to be given statutory effect, through changes to the Act, or as

defined in their own bespoke legislation - this creates a clear relationship with the Crown, which needs to be more strategic in the future; and

- the need for Māori Wardens to have surety of the Crown's support for their modernisation and future.

*Note that not all Districts identified their representatives for the Working Group. The final composition will be communicated shortly.*

Following lunch, the Minister provided a summary of the modernisation option vote results (a unanimous choice to move forward), and next steps.

From this hui, the Modernising Māori Wardens Working Group will be established. It will:

- be comprised of nominated representatives from the Māori Wardens Districts, the New Zealand Māori Council, Te Puni Kōkiri and NZ Police;
- meet at least 3 times before the end of 2019;
- report to the Minister before the end of 2019 on:
  - how the selected modernisation options will be developed and implemented, including what new arrangements are required, what legislative changes are required, and what new relationships are required; and
  - the timeframes within which the selected modernisation options can be implemented (an Action Plan).

Progress updates will be provided by District representatives, the Māori Wardens Project Regional Coordinators, and on the Māori Wardens webpage ([www.tpk.govt.nz/en/whakamahia/maori-wardens](http://www.tpk.govt.nz/en/whakamahia/maori-wardens)).

In closing, the Minister thanked everyone for their contributions throughout the Conference, and wished everyone safe travels home.



## **P.S. Awards Design**

Feedback was sought from Conference attendees to inform development of Awards for Māori Wardens. There were lots of ideas on what Māori Wardens should be recognised for (e.g. long-service, rohe-specific activities), how you should be recognised (e.g. certificates, pins/badges, taonga, trophies) and a few creative design ideas. There was lots of support for a modernised version of the Māori Wardens Association crest to be used, and interest in other Māori design possibilities.

Te Puni Kōkiri will secure a designer to prepare different options for Wardens to consider in the coming months.
